

Key Vocabulary

Capital city - the city or town that functions as the seat of government of a country.

Continent - any of the world's main continuous expanses of land.

Dynamics – how loud or quiet a piece of music is.

Europe – one of the 7 continents of the world.

Flag - a piece of cloth with a special design and colours, that is fixed to a pole as the symbol of a country or group.

Food - something that people and animals eat, or plants absorb, to keep them alive.

Human Feature – Are things are made by humans.

Landmark - a building that you can easily recognize, especially one that helps you to know where you are.

Mountains - a large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level.

Ocean - a very large expanse of sea.

Pitch – whether notes are high or low.

Physical Feature – Are things made by nature.

River – a large natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea, a lake, or another river.

Travel – to make a journey.

Weather -

the temperature or conditions outside, for example if it is hot, cold, sunny, etc.

Key Facts

The World is made of seven continents. The continents are Asia, Africa, North and South America, Antarctica, Europe, and Australasia. The World is made of five oceans. An ocean is a very large area of salt water. The oceans are Pacific, Atlantic, Indian, Southern and Arctic.

Geography

To identify countries that are in Europe. To use an atlas or map to locate countries in Europe.

Pupils will use an atlas to name countries on a map of Europe.

To name all 7 continents that make up the world map. To name the worlds 5 oceans. Pupils will learn different songs to name the continents and oceans. They will use an atlas to label the continents and oceans on a World map.

To compare where I live to another country in the UK. To identify the human and physical features of a country in Europe. Pupils will learn about the lifestyle, human and physical features of a range of European countries and compare them to United Kingdom. Countries include France, Germany, Norway and Spain.

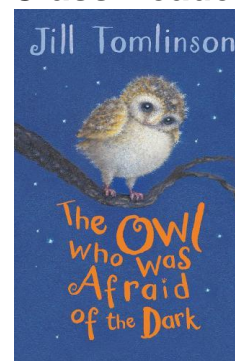
The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark

Art

To use printing techniques to create leaf pictures. Pupils will go on a leaf hunt to find different leaves. The leaves are used for printing to make a picture. To photograph leaves and print them to create a leaf collage. Pupils will use the iPad to take different leaf photos. These photos are used to make a leaf collage. To use a variety of shading techniques to add detail to my leaf drawings.

Using the leaves the pupils have found on their leaf hunt, they will draw them. Pupils will observe the lighter and darker shades and try to include shading in their drawings. To use different materials to add colour to my drawings.

Pupils will use oil pastels to add colour to their leaf drawings.
