

As you probably know from the news, many schools across the country are struggling financially, and Priory Primary is no exception.

How Can You Help?

Care of books and school property: This is very straightforward. Please make sure that reading books going home are well cared for, so we don't have to keep replacing them.

EasyFundraising: Priory Primary has an Easy Fundraising Account which goes towards the costs of school trips and visits. We can raise money from online shopping companies when you shop online, without it costing anything extra to you.

How it works - Set up an account via this link

When you shop online, go via the Easyfundraising site to see if the shop you are using is linked (I always use Argos this way, for example), and then click through to do your shopping. A percentage of your spend is automatically given to the school!

School Lunches: Believe it or not, it costs the school when children bring packed lunches. It would help us enormously if ALL children had a school lunch from Relish. These are completely FREE for pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2. The costs per day for older children in £2.45. All meals can be ordered online at home, on a day by day basis. If pupils who bring a packed lunch just have 2 or 3 school lunches each week, it would make a BIG difference to us.

Hello parents & carers,

During the Autumn term I delivered some assemblies to pupils to develop their understanding of what empathy is and how they can make sure that they demonstrate empathy towards others. I plan to revisit this with all pupils before the end of the school year and thought that I would take this opportunity to also share this with you.

What is empathy?

Empathy is being able to understand and care about how someone else is feeling



We use this expression to encourage children to try to imagine how someone else might be feeling.

Why is empathy important in our school community?

Our school community is extremely diverse and brings together different faiths, cultures and ethnicities. This makes it desirable and necessary to show our respect for people who have different beliefs and/or different backgrounds from our own.

We also have some pupils who experience challenges with specific areas of their development or learning, such as communication, social skills, academic learning or a physical disability. It is important that other pupils treat them as equals and with respect.





How can you develop empathy in your children? Model empathy by showing kindness: Demonstrate empathy in your own interactions with others, whether it's showing compassion to a neighbour or helping someone in need. Find out about opportunities to get the whole family involved in community activities which benefit others, such as litter picks or collecting for a charity.





Label emotions: Help children identify their own feelings and the feelings of others, using descriptive language e.g. "He looks angry because she took his pencil without asking first." Listen carefully to your children when they try to articulate how they are feeling. Then validate their emotions, rather than dismissing them. (This does not mean that you have to give in to them.) e.g, "I understand that you are feeling sad because I haven't bought you the sweets which you wanted. Eating sweets is not good for your teeth. You can have a healthy snack when you get home.

Read books: When we read stories, a character's emotions can feel really real.

Tuning in to these emotions can help us learn about other lives, perspectives, and feelings.

Ask children to consider how a particular character might be feeling and encourage them to give reasons for their ideas.



Empathy is a skill we can learn - and like a muscle, it grows the more we use it.
